Also addressing them was Dr. C. L. Kay, assistant president of Lubbock (Tex.) Christian College. He is also slated to speak tonight, tomorrow and Friday.

Tomorrow the girls will elect state officials and learn about state government, and on Wednesday they will cover national government.

A formal banquet is slated for Thursday night in the UNM Student Union ballroom.

Santa Fe Trip

Friday, the delegates will travel to Santa Fe for a tour of the state government offices.

Awards will be presented during a final assembly Saturday night, and the girls will leave for their homes Sunday.

Lubbock Educator Speaks

'68 Girls State Opens Meet at UNM Today

Dr. C. L. Kay, assistant president of Lubbock Christian College will be the featured speaker at New Mexico Girls State which opens its 1968 session today at the University of New Mexico.

Dr. Kay has been on the Girls State program for the past eight years.

The Lubbock educator will address the 8:30 p.m. Girls State assembly this evening on the subject "Freedom is on Trial." He also is scheduled to speak at 8:30 p.m. Monday on "Our Priceless Heritage"; on Tuesday at 8:30 p.m., on "The Power of Your Vote"; and at 8:30 p.m. Friday on "A Time to Remember."

GIRLS STATE, which is sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary, will bring scores of high school girls from across New Mexico to UNM for a week of practical experience in American democracy. The girls will form local, state and national governmental units, nominate officers, hold elections and carry out the functions of government for their simulated constituencies.

The session opens with registration this morning. The first general assembly will be held in the Student Union ballroom at 2:30 p.m. as an organizational meeting. At the second assembly at 6:30 p.m., Girls State delegates will be welcomed to UNM by president Tom L. Popejoy and Dean of Women Helen Whiteside, and will hear greetings from Mrs. Robert Crownover, national executive committeewoman for the American Legion Auxiliary.

The program Monday will be devoted to the formation of city units, city elections and city government.

ON TUESDAY, the girls will conduct state government functions, including elections for state offices, and on Wednesday

will begin their experiment in national government.

The highlight of the Thursday program will be the formal banquet at 6:30 p.m. in the student union ballroom and the inaugural for elected officials.

Friday will feature a trip to Santa Fe and visits to state offices, while Saturday will be devoted to exercises of government in action and the presentation of awards at the final assembly Saturday night.

The girls leave for their homes next Sunday.

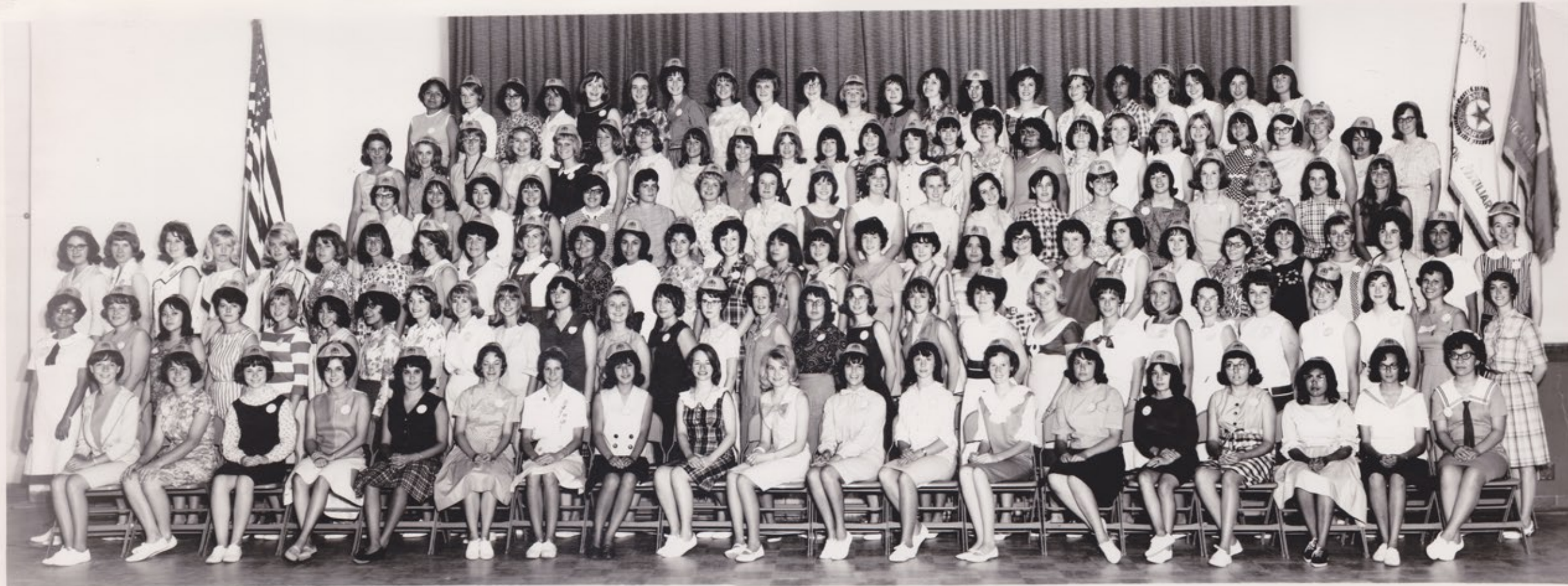
